

WORKSHOP #2:

"Symbolic Partial Fractions and Other Analytic Programs on a Hand Calculator"

This workshop will demonstrate a variety of analytic programs used in calculus and other courses. In the Harvard curriculum "analytic" is one of the triad and the hand calculator can do much to alleviate the boring details in some of these calculations cf. expanding a partial fraction with denominator of degree four.

The HP 48 will be used in the demonstrations. Additional calculators will be available so the participants can do hands-on.

The program for partial fractions will be used both for integrating rational functions and inverting Laplace transforms.

Symbolic substitution in definite integrals and integration by parts are two other programs to be covered. These programs assist the student in practicing these two skills. Miscellaneous programs such as graphical Newton's method and others will be demonstrated as time permits.




